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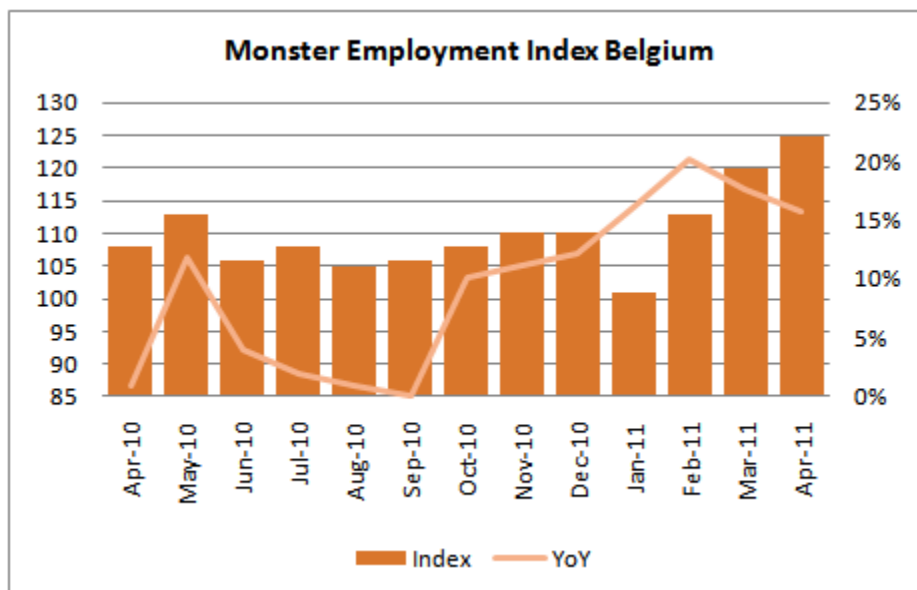
Online Recruitment Continues Positive Growth, Reports Monster Employment Index Belgium

April 2011 Index Highlights:

- Belgium records positive annual growth rate of 16 percent
- Europe maintained annual growth of 26 percent year-over-year
- HR leads all industry sectors in annual growth
- Banking, finance, and insurance charts the most substantial upward swing year-over-year
- Manufacturing and related sectors continues to show positive, but moderated, annual growth rates
- The Walloon region registers the most rapid annual growth in the country

The Monster Employment Index Europe is a monthly analysis of millions of online job opportunities culled from a large, representative selection of corporate career sites and job boards across the European Union, including Monster.be.

“When looking at Belgium from an economic perspective, little has changed between March and April, with Belgian unemployment remaining below the EU and Eurozone averages,” commented Warren Hammond, general manager of Monster Benelux. “From an employment perspective, online recruitment trends continue at a positive rate, despite some slowdown this month, particularly in the manufacturing and transport sectors that were first to see improvement. In April, sectors such as banking and public administration were particularly strong performers. With Germany being one of the core export markets for Belgium, we expect that Germany’s strong growth will have a positive influence on the Belgian online job offering market for the coming months.”

Industry Year-over-year Trends: 17 of the 21 industries monitored by the Index showed positive annual growth trends.

- **HR** (up 53 percent) led all industry sectors in annual growth
- **Public sector, defence, community** (up 49 percent) was the second-fastest growing sector in the Index from an annual perspective, where online recruitment activity was higher for protective service as well as administration
- **Banking, finance, insurance** (up 14 percent) continued to demonstrate the greatest momentum of growth among all sectors in the Index, with online opportunities for the sector concentrated among professional occupations
- **Production, manufacturing, maintenance, repair** (up four percent) continued to chart positive annual growth, but at a substantially slowed pace from prior months. Similarly, **Transport, post and logistics** (up six percent) was also up on the year, but at a milder pace
- **Environment, architecture, urbanism** (down 30 percent) remained the weakest trending in the Index year-over-year

Occupation Year-over-year Trends: Annual online demand for workers rose in all nine occupational categories in April; all groups exhibited positive annual growth.

- **Service workers and shop and market sales workers** (up 22 percent) registered a steeper than usual rise in online recruitment for this time of year, attributed to increased seasonal job opportunities in the retail and hospitality sectors
- **Craft and related trades workers** (up 40 percent) continued to take a strong lead in the Index by measure of annual growth
- **Plant and machine operators, and assemblers** (up 13 percent) noted the most dramatic downshift in annual growth, but remained up on the year

Geographic Year-over-year Trends: All three regions continued to record positive annual growth in April.

- **Brussels-Capital region** (up 12 percent) registered a stronger start to the spring recruitment season than seen this time last year, with heightened growth in accounting and HR
- **The Walloon region** (up 21 percent) exhibited the strongest annual growth, with sectors such as engineering and transport/logistics charting continued acceleration year-over-year within the region, in contrast with the trends of slowdown seen for the sectors nationwide
- **The Flemish region** (up 15 percent) continued to maintain a good level of positive growth

International Trends:

The Monster Employment Index Europe maintained annual growth of 26 percent year-over-year, demonstrating European employment is increasingly on the rise. Industrial production related sectors continued to lead the Index in annual growth, while the financial services segment exhibited further improvement year-over-year. Germany led all countries again in April with annual growth at a steady 45 percent.
