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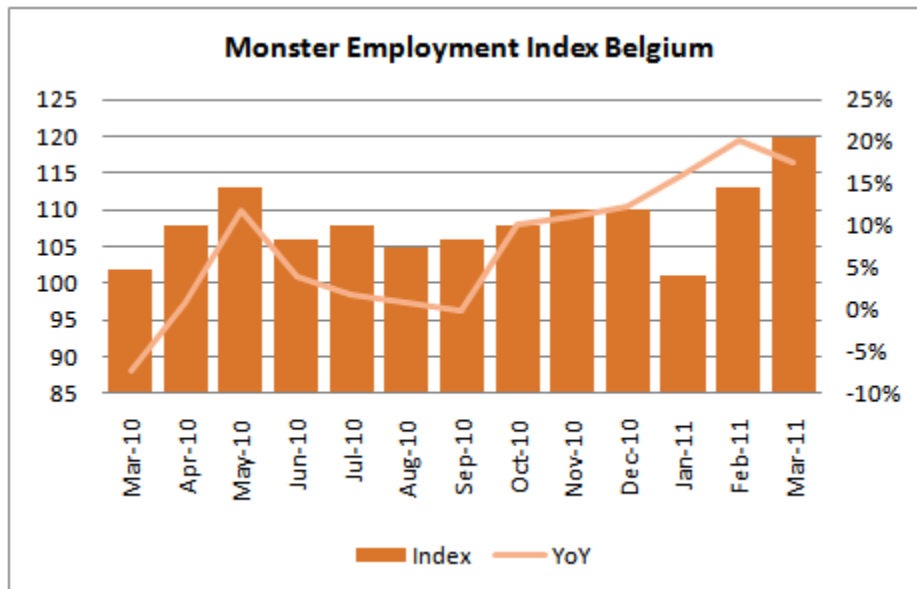
Online Recruitment Continues Positive Momentum, Reports Monster Employment Index Belgium

March 2011 Index Highlights:

- Belgium records positive annual growth rate of 18 percent
- Public sector, defence and community is among the top growth sectors annually in March
- Banking, finance, insurance charts most substantial upward swing in annual growth compared to February rates. Other sectors with strong upward momentum include IT and Research and development
- The Flemish region continues to lead all regions in terms of annual growth; Brussels-capital continues its modest rebound following an unseasonably slow start to the year

The Monster Employment Index Europe is a monthly analysis of millions of online job opportunities culled from a large, representative selection of corporate career sites and job boards across the European Union, including Monster.be.

“Despite recent cuts in government spending, the Index demonstrates steady patterns of growth in online recruitment across Belgium, driven by both the public and private sectors,” commented Bernard Hensmans, country manager of Monster Belgium. “In the private sector, industries such as manufacturing and transport which were initially first to see improvement following the recession are now being overtaken by HR and IT, which are continuing to drive recruitment.”

Industry Year-over-year Trends: 19 of the 21 industries monitored by the Index showed positive annual growth trends.

- **HR** (up 55 percent) continued to lead all sectors in the Index by rate of annual growth
- **Public sector, defence and community** (up 44 percent) proved a big growth sector in March despite the ongoing push for reductions in government spending across Belgium
- **Banking, finance, insurance** (up nine percent) charted the most substantial improvement in annual trend as the sector escaped the state of annual decline observed in February
- **Legal** (up three percent) continued its new positive trend while annual growth trends for business related industries remained strongest in IT (up 33 percent) and Research and development (up 27 percent)

Occupation Year-over-year Trends: Annual online demand for workers rose in all nine occupational categories in March.

- **Craft and related workers** (up 38 percent) continued to lead the Index in annual growth, closely followed by elementary occupations (up 26 percent)
- **Professionals** (up 16 percent) demonstrated annual growth that has held relatively steady since January, despite some swings in trends among specialised worker groups
- **Clerical** (up 11 percent) noted the most dramatic downshift in annual growth, but remained up on trends observed at the same time last year. Demand for these workers edged up between February and March in sectors such as sales, accounting, and administrative support.

Geographic Year-over-year Trends: All three regions recorded positive annual growth in March.

- **The Flemish Region** (up 17 percent) remained the strongest trending region in the Index, with notable growth over the year for large recruitment sectors such as Production, manufacturing, maintenance, and repair and Transport, post and logistics
- **The Walloon Region** (up 17 percent) charted growth that significantly exceeded levels from last year
- **Brussels-Capital Region** (up 11 percent) saw particularly strong gains within healthcare

International Trends:

The Monster Employment Index Europe increased 26 percent year-over-year, the most rapid pace seen during the current economic cycle. Industrial production related sectors led the Index in terms of annual growth in March, while notable improvements were observed across the financial services segment.
