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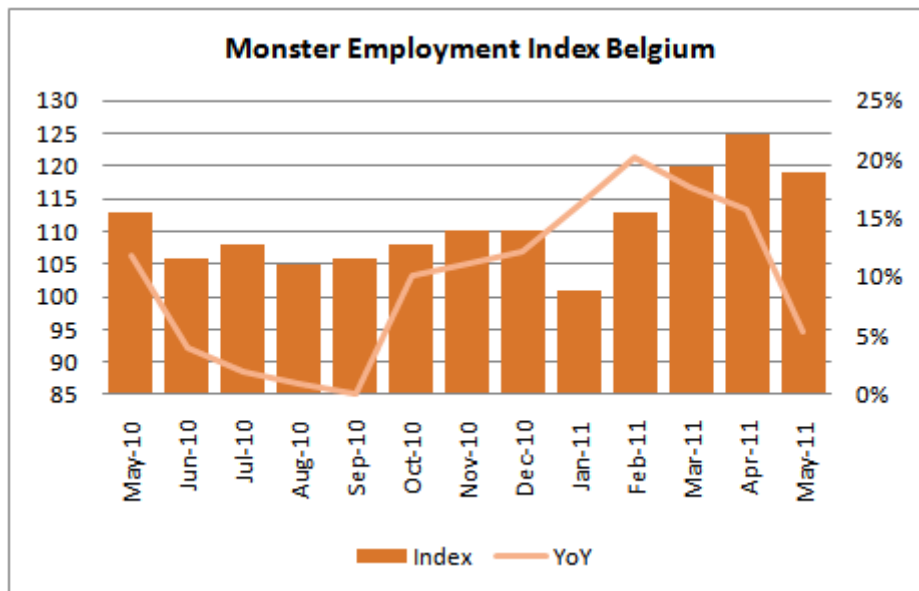
Online Recruitment Continues to Exhibit Positive Growth Trends, According to the Monster Employment Index Belgium

May 2011 Index Highlights:

- Belgium records a positive annual growth rate of five percent; a moderate result when compared with April
- **HR** continues to lead all industry sectors in annual growth
- **IT** exhibits strong annual growth despite a deceleration in growth rate
- The **Walloon** region continues to register the most rapid annual growth across all regions

The Monster Employment Index Europe is a monthly analysis of millions of online job opportunities culled from a large, representative selection of corporate career sites and job boards across the European Union, including Monster.be.

“The Belgian economy continues to exhibit positive signs of recovery in May, particularly when coupling the strong Index results with the recently revealed statistics that shows Belgium’s first quarter GDP outpaced the European average,” commented Rikke Wivel, Senior Director of Marketing Benelux at Monster Benelux. “From an employment perspective, despite a slowdown from the peak growth seen in February, online recruitment trends are positive and up from a year ago. The professional sectors, including HR and IT, are currently leading the recovery following an early break out from the manufacturing sectors.”

Industry Year-over-year Trends: 14 of the 21 industries monitored by the Index showed positive annual growth trends.

- **HR** (up 29 percent) led all industry sectors in annual growth
- **IT** (up 29 percent) was the second-fastest growing sector in the Index from an annual perspective and has been among the top performing sectors from an annual perspective throughout 2011
- **Public sector, defence, community** (up 18 percent) still maintains a high growth rate, though more restrained than the peaks seen in the April Index when its annual growth rate reached 49 percent
- **Environment, architecture, urbanism** (down 42 percent) remained the weakest trending in the Index year-over-year with its rate of decline accelerating in May

Occupation Year-over-year Trends: Annual online demand for workers rose for eight of the nine occupational categories in May

- **Craft and related trades workers** (up 22 percent) continued to take a strong but slightly decelerated lead in the Index by measure of annual growth
- **Skilled agricultural, forestry and fishery** (up eight percent) was the only occupational group to chart an increased annual growth rate in May compared to April
- **Service and sales workers** was the only industry sector to not exhibit an increase on the year, remaining at the exact same figure as it was in May 2010

Geographic Year-over-year Trends: All three regions continued to record positive annual growth in May.

- **The Walloon region** (up nine percent) was again the strongest trending region in the Index from an annual growth view. Sectors including IT and production charted continued acceleration in annual growth rates within the region, despite the slowdown seen for the sectors nationwide
- **Brussels-Capital region** (up eight percent) also registered a deceleration in annual growth trends despite trends remaining relatively strong for accounting, IT, engineering, and banking
- Current demand in **The Flemish region** (up four percent) continues to exceed year-ago levels

International Trends:

The Monster Employment Index Europe exhibited a 21 percent annual growth rate in May. Industrial production sectors like, Production, manufacturing, maintenance, and repair and Transport, post and logistics continued to lead the Index. Public sector, defence and community, and Legal exhibited annual declines, contrasted with the more positive annual trends of prior months.
