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Online Recruitment Continues to Grow Across Germany, According to Monster Employment Index

June 2010 Index Highlights:

- The Monster Employment Index Germany reported a five point (five percent) climb in June, extending the increasing trend to a fifth month. Year-on-year, job opportunities were up nine percent
- Transport, post and logistics reported the highest escalation of online job demand on both a monthly and annual basis, whilst publicly funded sectors such as education, training and library and public sector, defence, community also noted increases
- Brandenburg led all regions in monthly growth, whilst Baden-Württemberg reported the sharpest annual escalation of all German regions

Summary Overview

Online recruitment activity continued its upward trend in June as growth in the transport industry fuelled the overall uptick in the Monster Employment Index Germany. In addition, the Index's annual rate of growth accelerated in June, suggesting an overall upswing in hiring activity over recent months.

The Monster Employment Index Europe is a monthly analysis of millions of online job opportunities culled from a large, representative selection of corporate career sites and job boards across the European Union, including Monster.de.

“Recent external indicators, including industrial production and business confidence, suggest that the Germany economy is on the gradual path to recovery. We are also seeing this in the latest reading of the Index, where positive growth trends were seen in sectors including transport, administration and HR,” commented Marcus Riecke, vice president and general manager Central Europe, Monster Worldwide. “However, the European debt crisis is causing doubts about the speed of recovery, which has affected the weak level of hiring activity in management.”

Transport sector continues to report increased job demand

Transport, post and logistics noted the highest rate of increase once again, with online worker demand up 15 points (13 percent), leaving the sector at its highest level since December 2008. From a longer-term perspective, opportunities in the sector have increased 31 percent over the past three months and 44 percent compared to June 2009, the sharpest increase of all industry sectors.

Public-driven sectors noted a rebound in online recruitment activity in June, with education, training and library, climbing 14 points (13 percent), whilst opportunities were up 33 percent compared to year-earlier figures. Public sector, defence and community offerings also increased 11 points (11 percent) compared to May 2009 on the month.

June marked a turnaround in annual growth rates, with administration and organisation reporting a six percent increase in online worker demand. Similarly, HR noted a 20 percent increase in online job postings compared to June 2009. Sales saw its first annual uptick since December 2008, as job postings increased five percent compared to year-earlier levels.

In contrast, management and consulting reported the sharpest fall in online job demand from an annual perspective, with offerings down 23 percent.

Plant and machine operators and assemblers report sharpest monthly and annual rise in online job demand

Online job opportunities increased across all occupational groups in June, with plant and machine operators and assemblers leading all groups upwards. The group climbed for the fifth consecutive month, rising 13 points (11 percent) compared to May 2010 and 27 percent compared to year-earlier figures. Demand for the workers has doubled over the past year in the automotive sector, whilst transport, post and logistics registered increased demand for the group over the past year.

Craft and related trade workers saw a 10 point (eight percent) rise in June, whilst demand was up 17 percent year-on-year.

In contrast, managers continued to exhibit the weakest long-term trend and remained the only occupational group not to see worker demand above year-earlier figures, with online recruitment activity at the same level as June 2009.

Brandenburg leads majority of regions upward in June

Nearly all German regions reported elevated online job demand, led by Brandenburg, where online job availability increased seven points (six percent). The large Bayern market noted a two point (three percent) rise following muted activity between April and May.

Hamburg was the only region not to exhibit an increase in online job postings, with opportunities remaining steady over the past five months.

From a longer term perspective, Baden-Württemberg noted the sharpest annual increase, with opportunities up 18 percent. Conversely, opportunities in Saarland were down six percent compared to June 2009, the steepest annual fall of all regions.

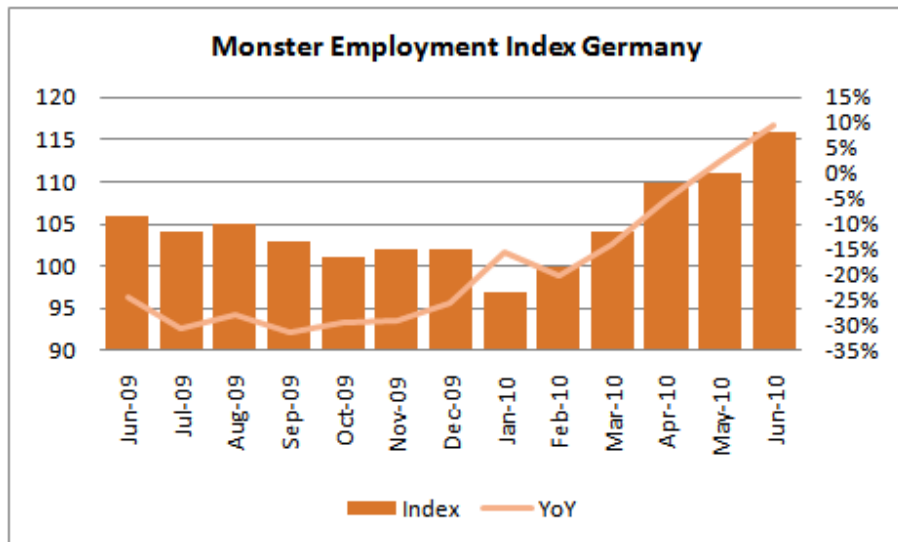
