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Online Job Demand Rebounds in July, Reports Monster Employment Index France

July 2010 Index Highlights

- The Monster Employment Index France gained five points (four percent) in July. Year-on-year, online job availability was up 18 percent
- The majority of industry sectors noted a rise in July, with education, training and library noting the largest monthly gain
- All French regions reported an increase in July, with the North reporting the greatest rise

Summary Overview

Online recruitment activity rebounded in July following the seasonal slowdown of early summer. Among sectors, demand trends have been notably strong in banking, production, and transport over the past three months. Nationwide, longer-term growth continues to be robust, with the Index up 18 percent year-on-year.

"Following a sharp dip in June, online recruitment activity accelerated in July, bringing the level of online job opportunities back to 2010's peak. This is encouraging for current job seekers and suggests the demand in the job market remains buoyant," commented Bruno Brémont, vice president of Monster France and Southern Europe. "In July we've seen positive developments in the education sector, while banking continues to recover. With the largest banks

recently passing the European banking stress test, hopefully confidence will continue to grow across industry.”

Majority of industry sectors note rise in online job opportunities

Online recruitment increased in 17 of the 21 industry sectors monitored by the Index, with education, training and library reporting the greatest monthly increase.

Opportunities were up 20 points (22 percent), adhering to established seasonal trends. The sector also reported a 33 percent increase year-on-year, one of the strongest annual results of all industry sectors.

The administrative and organisation sector increased by 19 points (17 percent) in July 2010, whilst opportunities continued to increase on an annual basis, with offerings up 22 percent.

Online recruitment activity in the production, manufacturing, maintenance and repair sector gained 11 points (six percent). Similarly, transport, post and logistics sector reported a steep hiring increase in July, following stagnation in June.

In contrast, the healthcare and social work industry noted one of the sharpest dips, losing 11 points (four percent). However, the sector continues to lead the industries in terms of year-on-year growth, reporting an increase of 79 points (48 percent) compared to July 2009.

Online demand for workers grew in the majority of occupational groups

Online demand for workers grew in eight of the nine occupation groups in July. Plant and machine operators and assemblers reported the greatest increase, gaining 19 points (10 percent) and climbing to its highest level since August 2008.

Demand for elementary workers climbed to its highest figure since March 2009, as opportunities rose seven points (10 percent) year-on-year.

Year-on-year, managers exhibited the most rapid rise in online demand, increasing by 32 percent since July 2009.

Service and sales workers was the only group to show a decrease in online job demand, falling by one point (one percent) year-on-year.

North leads all French regions in monthly growth

Following a sharp fall in June, the north region recorded the greatest increase of all French regions in July with opportunities up 11 points (nine percent) in July year-on-year.

The capital region, Ile de France, gained five points (five percent) and continues to hold the greatest year-on-year increase of all regions. Opportunities were up 22 percent compared to July 2009.

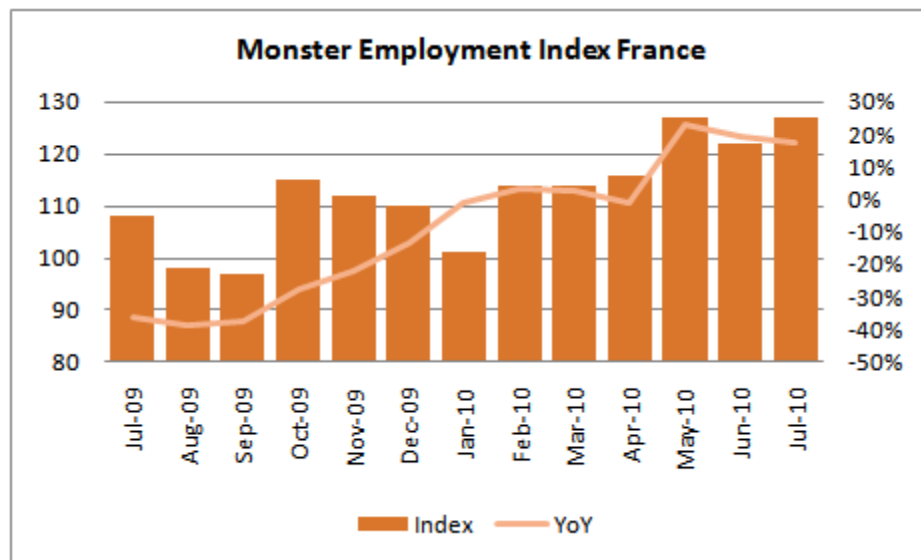
