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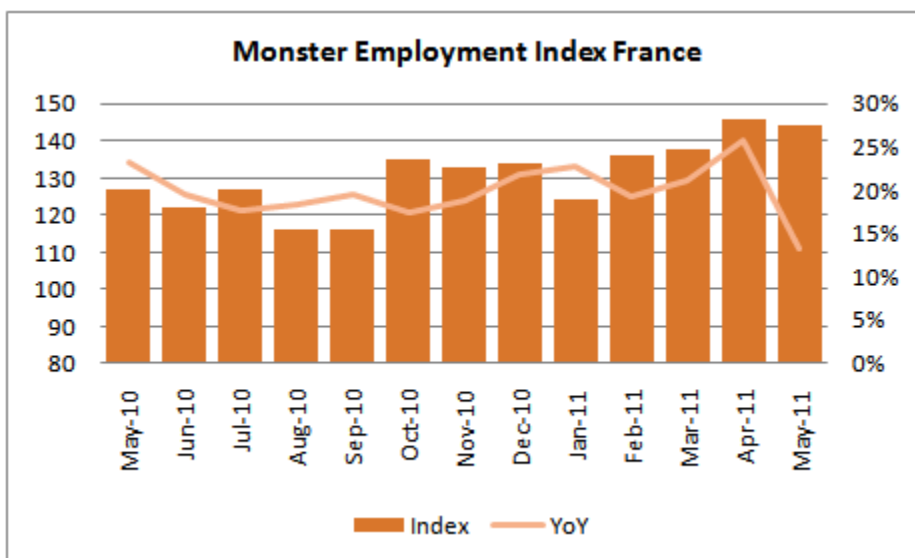
Online Recruitment in France Nears Current Cycle Peak, According to Monster Employment Index France

May 2011 Index Highlights:

- The Monster Employment Index France demonstrates 13 percent year-over-year growth in May
- The legal sector registered gains, with annual growth swinging to a positive pace
- Ile de France was the fastest growth region in the Index on the year
- Production, manufacturing, maintenance and repair is the highest performing sector year-over-year, the industry sector is at its highest level for this time of year since the Monster Employment Index began
- Managers experienced a substantial slowdown in growth momentum when compared to April's heated pace of expansion in available opportunities

The Monster Employment Index Europe is a monthly analysis of millions of online job opportunities culled from a large, representative selection of corporate career sites and job boards across the European Union, including Monster.fr.

“Across France, the Monster Index indicates continued strong economic growth throughout May,” commented Bruno Bremond, vice president of Monster France and Southern Europe. “While Ile de France was the fastest growing region, the fact that six of the seven regions noted strong annual growth is a clear sign economic recovery is improving across France. With both production and clerical industries noting strong results in May, all indicators suggest growth is not concentrated to certain occupational groups and is slowly becoming a universal trend as the economic cycle continues.”

Industry Year-over-year Trends: 14 of the 21 industries monitored by the Index showed positive annual growth.

- **Production, manufacturing, maintenance and repair** (up 33 percent) led all industry sectors in terms of year-over-year growth
- **Marketing, PR and Media** (up 27 percent) noted strong annual gains despite a month-over-month dip in May
- **Research and development** (up 32 percent) charted strong annual growth, although the rate has slowed slightly compared to April's 41 percent
- **Education, training and library** (down 17 percent) recorded the slowest growth amidst the sectors in May

Occupation Year-over-year Trends: Annual online demand for workers rose in all nine occupational categories for the second consecutive month.

- **Service and sales workers** (up 18 percent) recorded the highest growth in May amidst occupations despite a decelerated rate of annual growth as the typically heated seasonal activity of April subsided
- **Managers** (up 17 percent) remained up on May last year despite reduced demand for upper level management within a variety of sectors
- **Craft and related trade workers** (up five percent) registered the weakest annual increase, yet managed its strongest May result since 2008

Geographic year-over-year Trends: Six of the seven regions recorded positive annual growth.

- **Ile de France** (up 16 percent) continued to rebound following a relatively weak start to the year
- **Mediterranean** (down one percent) was the only region to exhibit a marginal year-over-year downturn following a strong spike in May 2010
- Other regions to note strong annual results include the **West** (up 16 percent) and the **East** (up 15 percent)

International Trends:

The Monster Employment Index Europe exhibited a 21 percent annual growth rate in May. Industrial production sectors like, Production, manufacturing, maintenance, and repair and Transport, post and logistics continued to lead the Index. Public sector, defence and community, and Legal exhibited annual declines, contrasted with the more positive annual trends of prior months.
