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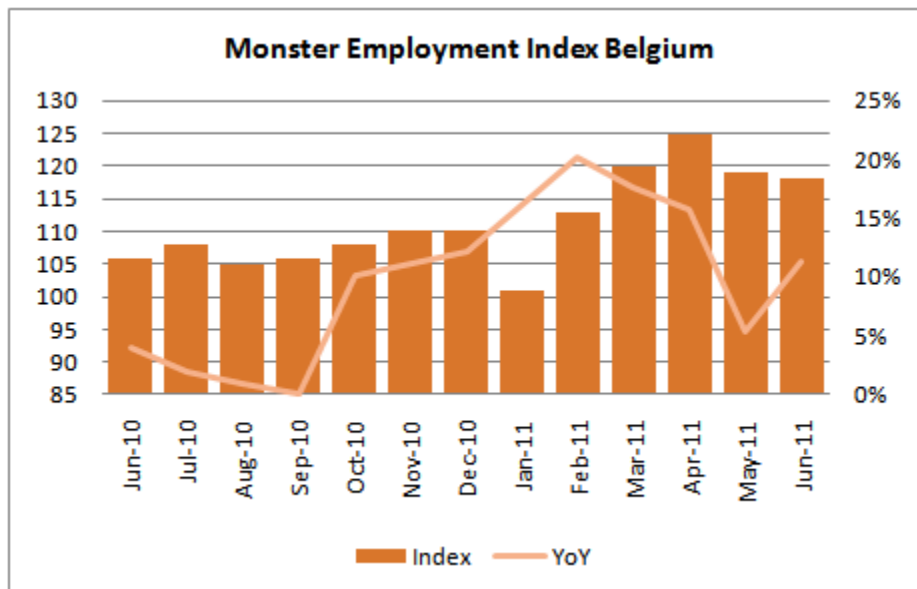
Belgian Public Sector is Soaring Compared to the Rest of Europe, According to the Monster Employment Index Belgium

June 2011 Index Highlights:

- Belgium exhibits an annual growth rate of 11 percent in June; a substantial improvement to the five percent annual growth rate observed in May
- IT, HR and Public Sector continue to lead all sectors up
- In contrast, year-over-year declines are most dramatic for the Environment, architecture, urbanism sector
- The Walloon region continues to register the most rapid annual growth, while Brussels sees its annual growth rate exceed the national pace

The Monster Employment Index Europe is a monthly gauge of online job demand based on a real-time review of millions of employer job opportunities culled from a large representative selection of career websites and online job listings across Europe, including Belgium. The Index does not reflect the trend of any one advertiser or source, but is an aggregate measure of the change in job listings across the industry.

“The Monster Employment Index Belgium demonstrates online recruitment is continuing to trend strongly in several professional service sectors,” commented Rikke Wivel, Senior Director of Marketing Benelux at Monster Benelux. “Even previously hard-hit sectors, such as banking, show improved growth trends, while high concentrations of public sector and related industry recruitment continue to act as a stabiliser for the Belgian labour market.”

Industry Year-over-year Trends: 16 of the 21 industry sectors exhibited improved online recruitment activity over the year in June.

- **IT** (up 49 percent) saw substantial growth over the year and surpassed all other industry sectors
- **HR** and **Public sector, defence, community** (both up 37 percent) were the second fastest growing industries and continued to maintain a strong growth rate
- **Healthcare, Social Work** (down 18 percent) remained in decline, continuing the trend seen in previous months' Index results
- **Environment, architecture, urbanism** (down 28 percent) experienced the sharpest annual fall among industry sectors in June

Occupation Year-over-year Trends: Each of the nine occupational groups monitored by the Monster Employment Index in June saw an increase in online job opportunities

- **Craft and related trades workers** (up 31 percent) continued to lead the occupational groups with an accelerated growth rate compared to May
- **Clerical support workers** (up eight percent) saw the most moderate annual growth among occupational groups in the Index this month
- **Service and sales workers** (up 11 percent) demand increased in June after being the only occupational group in May 2011 that remained flat

Geographic Year-over-year Trends: All three regions continued to demonstrate increased annual growth in June.

- **The Walloon region** (up 23 percent) remained the strongest trending region in the Index with extensive annual growth compared to May's nine percent increase
- Online worker demand was steady in **the Brussels-Capital region** (up 15 percent), with relatively strong growth across accounting, IT, engineering, and banking
- **The Flemish region** (up eight percent) exhibited the weakest demand among regions but continued to exceed year-ago levels

International Trends:

The Monster Employment Index Europe demonstrated 23 percent annual growth in June, up from the 21 percent observed in May. Industrial production related sectors led the Index for the fifth consecutive month while the Arts, Public sector, defence and community and Banking sectors exhibited annual declines. Germany remained the star performer, leading all countries up.
