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EMPLOYMENT INDEX

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Online Job Opportunities Contract During the Summer, According to Monster Employment Index Netherlands

July 2010 Index Highlights:

- The Monster Employment Index Netherlands dipped one point (one percent) in July; year-on-year however, job demand was up two percent
- The majority of industry sectors reported weaker online job demand, with agriculture, fishing and forestry and public sector, defence and community falling the most
- Opportunities in Overijssel dipped the most, whilst Zeeland and Drenthe exhibited the sharpest monthly uptick among Dutch regions

Summary Overview

Following increased demand over the late-spring and early-summer months, online job opportunities noted a mild dip in July. In addition, whilst opportunities remained up compared to year-earlier levels, the annual growth rate slowed in July, suggesting mild downshift in job creation drivers. Despite these declines, production, manufacturing, maintenance, repair has seen three months of elevated online job opportunities.

The Monster Employment Index Europe is a monthly analysis of millions of online job opportunities culled from a large, representative selection of corporate career sites and job boards across the European Union, including Monsterboard.nl.

“We’ve seen a steady increase in online job opportunities from January this year. There was a one point drop in July from June however, despite this seasonal correction, the year-on-year positive trend which started in June remains and there are good reasons to feel confident that this will continue,” commented Warren Hammond, Managing Director of Monsterboard.nl. “Industries such as marketing, PR and media nearly doubled year-on-year which is great news for job seekers in those markets, which were hit especially hard over the last 18 months. These numbers, along with growing consumer confidence and GDP shows that the Dutch economy is continuing its gradual path to recovery.”

Agriculture and public sector fall, as transport exhibits upswing

The majority of occupational groups saw online job opportunities dip in July, with only six industry sectors reporting elevated levels of activity. Agriculture, fishing and forestry reported the sharpest fall among industry sector, as opportunities dipped 10 points (eight percent). The sector also reported one of the sharpest annual rates of decline, with opportunities down 17 percent.

Job demand in public sector, defence and community was down 10 points (seven percent), whilst demand was flat during the past three months. From an annual perspective, offerings have declined 17 percent compared to July 2009, reflecting a slowdown in demand in the face of budget cuts.

Online recruitment activity was flat in administrative and organisation; engineering; and HR sectors in July. Over the past three month, these sectors have reported the slowest growth rates of all industry sectors.

In contrast, transport, post and logistics reported the largest upswing in online recruitment activity, as offerings climbed to a 17-month high, with opportunities growing 23 points (16 percent) between June and July. From a longer-term perspective, online demand was up 34 percent over the past three months and 26 percent year-on-year.

Majority of occupational groups report increased job demand whilst skilled agricultural and fishery worker dip

Online job demand fell the most for skilled agricultural and fishery worker in July, with offerings down 19 points (10 percent) compared to June 2010. From a longer-term perspective, the sector dipped five percent over the past three months and opportunities were down 21 percent compared to year-earlier figures.

Professionals noted its first monthly decline in online worker demand since January 2010, as offerings dipped three points (three percent). From an annual perspective, online opportunities were down five percent.

In contrast, technicians and associate professionals reported a third month of elevated online job opportunities, as offerings climbed three points (four percent) between June and July 2010.

From a longer-term perspective, elementary occupations exhibited the sharpest growth, with offerings up 22 percent over the past three months and 24 percent compared to July 2009.

Overijssel reports sharpest monthly dip in online job demand whilst opportunities in Zeeland and Drenthe lead growth

The majority of occupation groups exhibited a dip in online recruitment activity in July, with Overijssel reporting the sharpest monthly fall, as offerings slid 11 points (nine percent). Despite this, opportunities in the region were up two percent compared to July 2009.

In contrast, both Zeeland and Drenthe reported the strongest monthly growth among Dutch regions, as online offerings climbed 10 points (seven percent) and eight points (seven percent) respectively. In addition, Zeeland exhibited the sharpest increase from a longer-term perspective, as offerings were up 11 points (eight percent) compared to July 2009.

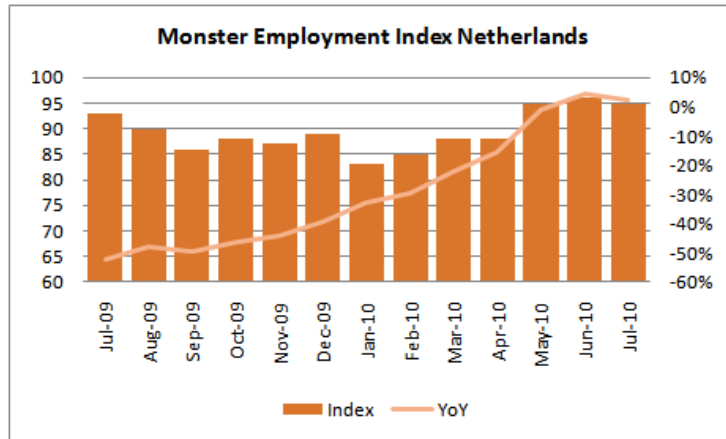
