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EMPLOYMENT INDEX

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Online Job Opportunities Above Year-earlier Levels, According to Monster Employment Index Netherlands

June 2010 Index Highlights:

- The Monster Employment Index Netherlands edged up one point (one percent) in June; year-on-year offerings were up four percent
- Banking, finance and insurance reported the sharpest monthly increase in online job availability; marketing, PR and media climbed the most on an annual basis
- Noord-Holland noted the largest monthly uptick among Dutch regions, whilst Overijssel was up the most on an annual basis

Summary Overview

June marked the second consecutive month of growth for online job opportunities, as well as signalled a turn in long-term trend. The Index reported annual growth for the first time since June 2008, with opportunities up four percent compared to June 2009. These positive signs, along with ongoing increased job demand in professional sectors including banking suggest that Dutch economy and industry remain on the path to recovery.

The Monster Employment Index Europe is a monthly analysis of millions of online job opportunities culled from a large, representative selection of corporate career sites and job boards across the European Union, including Monsterboard.nl.

“The first annual increase in online job postings for two years highlights an overall improvement in the recruitment industry,” commented Warren Hammond, Managing Director of Monsterboard.nl. “Although we remain cautious about overall growth, positive trends in industry sectors which were hit by the recession, including banking, research and development and media, are encouraging for job seekers.”

Sectors hit by recession report uptick in online job demand; banking, finance and insurance reports largest monthly increase

The majority of industry sectors noted increased online job opportunities in June, led by banking, finance and insurance where opportunities climbed five points (10 percent), bringing the sector at its highest level since March 2009. The sector grew 25 percent over the past three months and was up 15 percent compared to June 2009.

Online opportunities in research and development increased six points (seven percent) in June and 33 percent year-on-year. The uptick reflects ongoing investment in the industry which noted reduced hiring activity during the recession.

Marketing, PR and media offerings grew four points (seven percent) whilst the sector reported the sharpest annual increase in online job postings, with opportunities up 40 percent compared to June 2009.

Both the engineering and IT sectors reported a two percent fall in online job offerings in June. Both sectors also fell on an annual basis, with opportunities down six percent and eight percent respectively.

Elementary occupations climb the most on a monthly and annual basis

Online recruitment activity climbed the most for elementary occupations in June, as offerings jumped 19 points (nine percent), with Noord-Brabant reporting the biggest uptick in worker demand. From a longer term perspective, the group was up 29 percent over the last three months, and 27 percent compared to June 2009, the biggest annual uptick of groups.

Plant and machine operators and assemblers reported a four point (six percent) uptick in worker demand in June, largely due to increased hiring in the manufacturing, construction and transportation sectors.

Clerical support workers however reported the sharpest decrease in online recruitment activity, as offerings dipped six points (five percent). Online job demand was also down one percent compared to June 2009.

Noord-Holland registers largest monthly uptick in online job demand

Only four Dutch regions noted increased hiring activity in June, led by Noord-Holland, where opportunities increased one point (two percent). From a longer term perspective, the region increased eight percent over the past three months and was up two percent year-on-year.

Zeeland, Friesland and Overijssel all noted a one percent increase in online job opportunities in June. Overijssel reported the largest annual uptick of all regions, with a nine percent rise.

In contrast, Limburg exhibited the sharpest monthly decline, with opportunities dipping five points (five percent). However, the region was up seven percent year-on-year.

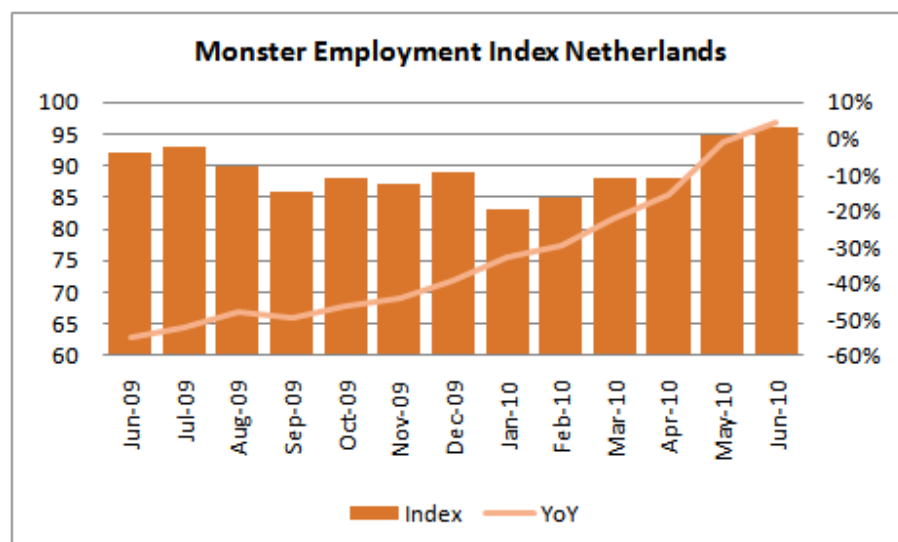
