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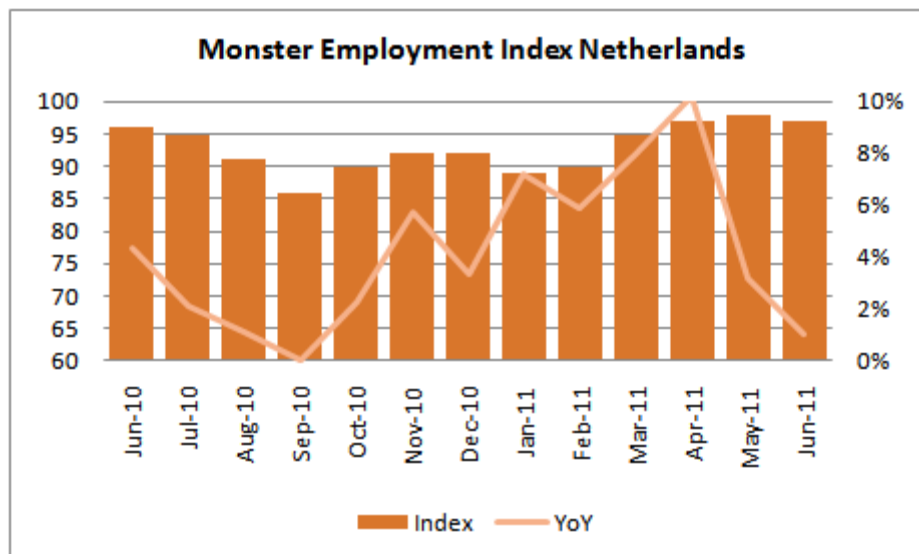
Hospitality and Tourism at Two-Year High For Springtime, According to Monster Employment Index Netherlands

June 2011 Index Highlights:

- The Monster Employment Index Netherlands registers one percent annual growth in June, a slight dip on May's pace
- Hospitality and tourism recruitment is at a two-year high for June with a 14 percent increase year-over-year
- Transport and logistics continues to lead all sectors in annual growth
- Banking, finance, insurance and Legal are among the lowest growth sectors in the professional service segment, with an 18 percent annual decrease respectively
- Noord-Brabant maintains its leadership position over the larger regions in annual online job demand

The Monster Employment Index Europe is a monthly gauge of online job demand based on a real-time review of millions of employer job opportunities culled from a large representative selection of career websites and online job listings across Europe. The Index does not reflect the trend of any one advertiser or source, but is an aggregate measure of the change in job listings across the industry.

“While the rate of growth is slightly slowed at one percent in June, the Index level has remained unchanged since April and we continue to see improvements in certain sectors in an otherwise cautious market,” said Warren Hammond, managing director of Monsterboard.nl. “Hospitality and tourism is at a two-year high reflecting even stronger seasonal hiring activity than last year. Transport and logistics continues to be the star performer, underscoring the central role of commerce through the country as the economic recovery continues.”

Industry Year-over-year Trends: Annual growth was positive in eight of the 19 sectors monitored by the Index.

- **Hospitality and tourism** (up 13 percent) registered a continued upward trend and a two-year high
- **Transport and logistics** (up 24 percent), remained the strongest performer of all industry sectors
- **Production, manufacturing, maintenance, repair** and **Sales** (both up six percent) maintained their positions as the top growth sectors in the Index, despite easing slightly from May to June
- **IT** (up 13 percent) remained in third place in the top growth industries for the second consecutive month
- **Banking, finance, insurance** and **Legal** (both down 18 percent) were among the lowest growth sectors in the professional service segment

Occupation Year-over-year Trends: Online job activity rose in five of the nine occupational groups monitored by the Index.

- **Service and sales workers** (up 11 percent) achieved the largest annual gains among all occupational groups in the Index, generally mirroring online job demand across the primarily consumer-driven sectors, sales and hospitality
- **Professionals** (down one percent) continued to register a marginal decline annually
- **Technicians and associate professionals** and **craft and related trade workers** (up nine percent) reflected the increase in recruitment activity within the industrial sectors
- **Clerical support workers** (down five percent) recorded lower annual online job demand which aligns with the decline in the legal and banking, finance and insurance sectors

Geographic Year-over-year Trends: Annual growth was registered in nine of the 12 regions monitored by the Index.

- **Limburg** (up 16 percent) continued to lead all regions in annual growth for the second month in a row
- **Noord-Brabant** (up five percent) noted the fasted annual growth pace of the larger regional markets, while still reflecting a downshift from the region's 14 percent pace in April
- **Zuid-Holland** (down seven percent) continued to lead the lowest growth regions for the second consecutive month

International Trends:

The Monster Employment Index Europe demonstrated 23 percent annual growth in June, up from the 21 percent observed in May. Industrial production related sectors led the Index for the fifth consecutive month while the Arts, Public sector, defence and community and Banking sectors exhibited annual declines. Germany remained the star performer, leading all countries up.
