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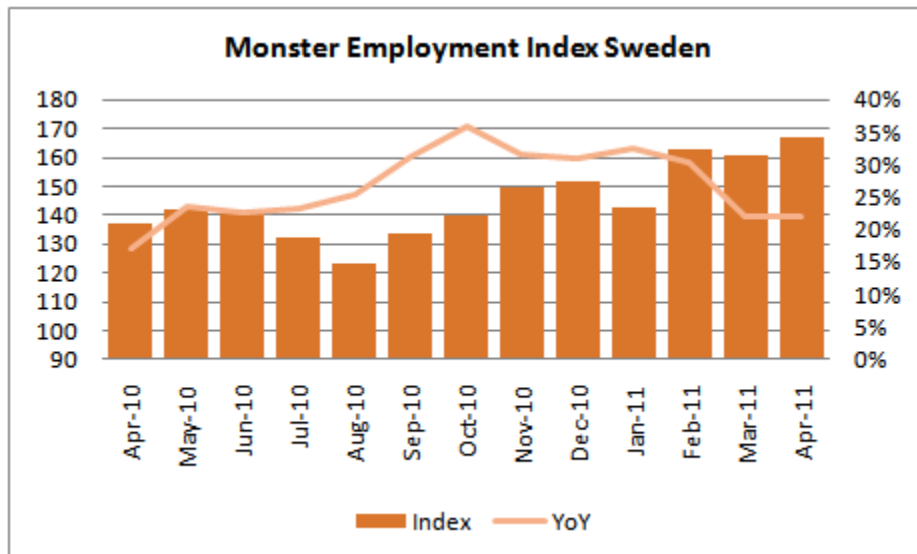
Annual Growth in Recruitment Continues to Stabilise the Economy, Reports Monster Employment Index Sweden

April 2011 Index Highlights:

- Annual growth rate continues to remain positive, rising 22 percent year-over-year in April
- Construction and extraction rises significantly, adhering to the sector’s traditional seasonal recruitment patterns
- Engineering and IT continue to exhibit the most rapid rates of annual growth in the Index
- Ostra Mellansverige remains the top region in the Index by measure of annual growth

The Monster Employment Index Europe is a monthly analysis of millions of online job opportunities culled from a large, representative selection of corporate career sites and job boards across the European Union, including Monster.se.

“According to government figures, Sweden’s economy seems very stable,” commented Carl Silverstolpe, managing director, Monster Scandinavia. “In this climate, it appears the labour market continues to hold firm and the online recruitment space continues to expand at a moderate pace. The growth in sectors such as engineering and IT has been substantial over the past year and this continues to hold true; these sectors are undoubtedly leading the country’s recruitment drive.”

Industry Year-over-year Trends: 15 of the 17 industries monitored by the Index showed positive annual growth.

- **Engineering** (up 53 percent) showed mild deceleration in rate of growth but continued to lead all industries forward
- **IT** (up 41 percent) was the second top-trending industry in the Index
- **Construction and extraction** (up 30 percent) rose significantly, adhering to the sector’s traditional seasonal recruitment patterns
- **Healthcare, social work** (up seven percent) charted an improved annual trajectory in the Index, from just one percent registered in March
- **Hospitality and tourism** (down five percent) moved into negative annual growth making it the poorest trending industry in the Index

Occupation Year-over-year Trends: Annual online demand for workers rose in all nine occupational categories monitored by the Index.

- **Plant and machine operators and assemblers** (up 34 percent) led all occupations in rate of annual growth
- **Professionals** (up 24 percent) showed substantial acceleration in annual growth trends, caused by increased demand for professional level workers in healthcare and education
- **Legislators, senior officials and managers** (up 30 percent) remained one of the fastest growing in the Index from an annual view, with solid growth trends for workers at this level in engineering and banking

Geographic Year-over-year Trends: All four markets recorded positive annual growth in April.

- **Östra Mellansverige** (up 31 percent) remained the fastest growing region year-over-year, but did exhibit a slowdown in annual growth rate in April
- **Norra Sverige** (up 26 percent) registered the strongest monthly rise among regions during April

International Trends:

The Monster Employment Index Europe maintained annual growth of 26 percent year-over-year, demonstrating European employment is increasingly on the rise. Industrial production related sectors continued to lead the Index in annual growth while the financial services segment recruitment exhibited further improvement year-over-year. Germany led all countries again in April with annual growth at a steady 45 percent.
