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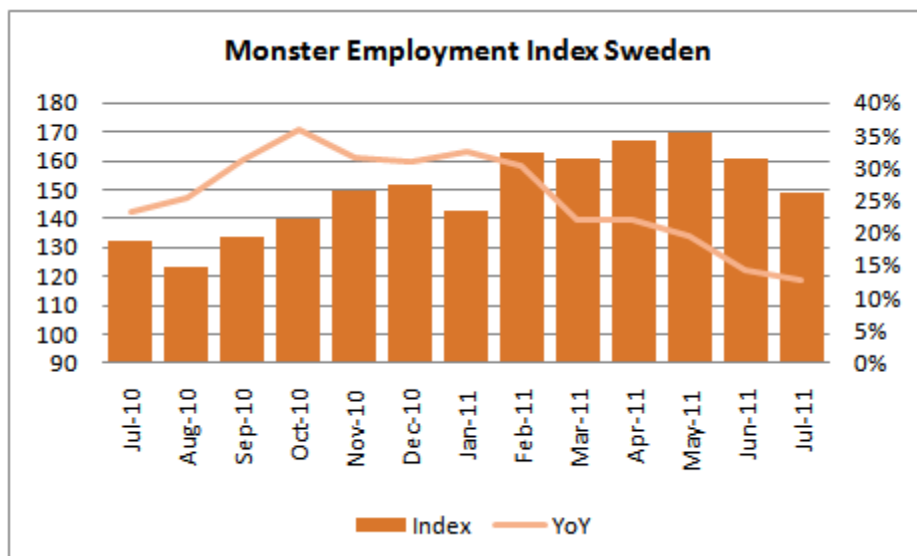
Online Recruitment Exhibits Growth Across All Regions in July, According to Monster Employment Index

July 2011 Index Highlights:

- Sweden records a positive annual growth rate of 13 percent in July, reflecting a marginal slow down on June's 14 percent rate
- **Engineering** continues to outpace all sectors in the Index
- **Transport, post and logistics** and **IT** also recorded significant annual gains
- **Healthcare and social work** joins **Hospitality and tourism** as a major sector to demonstrate annual decline in the Index
- **Östra Mellansverige** climbs to leading position among regions in the Index

The Monster Employment Index Europe is a monthly gauge of online job demand based on a real-time review of millions of employer job opportunities culled from a large representative selection of career websites and online job listings across Europe, including Sweden. The Index does not reflect the trend of any one advertiser or source, but is an aggregate measure of the change in job listings across the industry.

“Although the rate of growth in online recruitment is continuing at a slower pace than seen six or nine months ago, we are still seeing signs of steady growth across the labor market,” commented Carl Silverstolpe, managing director, Monster Scandinavia. “The performance of several sectors in July’s Index indicates encouraging signs for the ongoing stability of the labour market. Engineering, for instance leads all sectors with a growth rate of 41 percent while transport and logistics and IT sees a significant rise as well.”

Industry Year-over-year Trends: 14 of the 17 industries monitored by the Index exhibited positive annual growth in July.

- **Engineering** (up 41 percent) continued to record strong growth rates, and maintained its top position in annual growth for the third consecutive month
- Both **Transport, post and logistics** (up 32 percent) and **IT** (up 27 percent) registered substantial annual gains in July
- **Agriculture, fishing and forestry** (down five percent) saw a moderate decline compared to its five percent growth in June and is now the weakest performing industry sector

Occupation Year-over-year Trends: Online demand for workers rose in eight of the nine occupational groups in the July Index.

- **Plant and machine operators, and assemblers** (up 25 percent) outperformed all other occupational groups in the July Index
- **Professionals** (up 20 percent) increased its rate of annual growth by four percent from last month, continuing its run of double digit annual gains to a sixteenth consecutive month
- **Skilled agricultural, forestry and fishery workers** (down one percent) was the slowest growing occupational group in July, replacing **Service and sales workers** (up two percent), which showed signs of recovery with a slight increase across the sector's online employment opportunities

Geographic Year-over-year Trends: All of the four regions achieved positive annual growth rates for the third consecutive month.

- **Östra Mellansverige** (up 18 percent) registered an accelerated growth pace in July and took the leading position among all regions in the Index
- **Norra Sverige** (up 12 percent) exhibited a slightly slower annual growth pace than the rest of Sweden, where recruitment gains were relatively strong for healthcare, as well as production sectors

International Trends:

The Monster Employment Index Europe demonstrated 21 percent annual growth in July, down slightly from the 23 percent pace observed in June. Industrial production sectors complete a sixth consecutive month at the top with the strongest growth of all industries. Telecommunication remains a strong performer in July, moving to fourth position by measure of annual growth in the Index. Public sector and the Arts remain in annual decline although the Arts experiences a slight easing on its rate of decline.
