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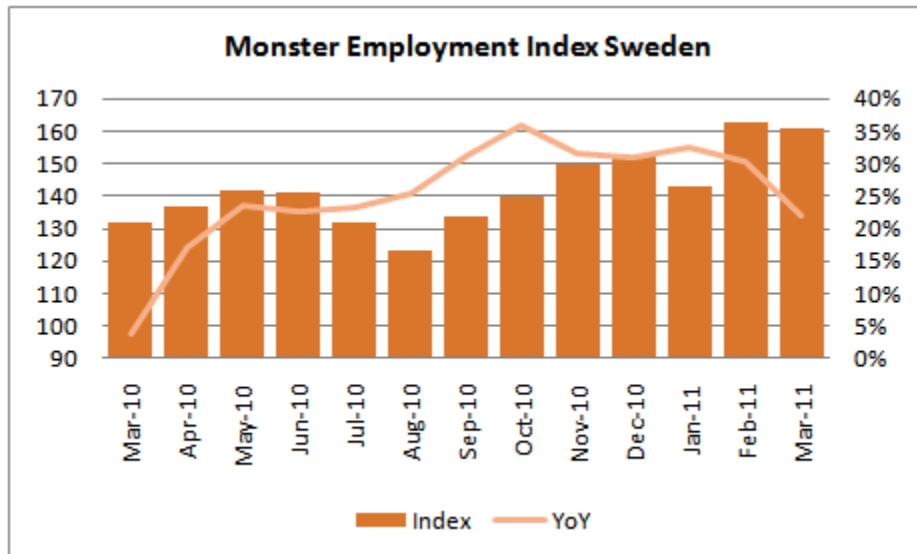
Sweden Records Annual Growth Rate Of 22 Percent in March as Online Recruitment in Finance Sector Rises, Reports Monster Employment Index

March 2011 Index Highlights:

- Annual growth rate continues to remain positive, rising 22 percent year-over-year in March. Banking, finance, insurance is a key growth driver in the March Index and maintains relatively robust annual gains. Accounting, audit, taxes is the only sector to chart stronger year-over-year gains in March than in February
- Engineering and IT continues to exhibit the most rapid rates of annual growth in the Index
- Hospitality and tourism momentum dissipates, with annual growth going flat in March
- Ostra Mellansverige is the top trending region in the Index by measure of annual growth

The Monster Employment Index Europe is a monthly analysis of millions of online job opportunities culled from a large, representative selection of corporate career sites and job boards across the European Union, including Monster.se.

“Sweden is continuing its economic rise with the March Index displaying a solid double-digit annual growth, but the pace has slowed somewhat,” commented Carl Silverstolpe, managing director, Monster Scandinavia. “Nonetheless, it is undeniable that the job market has improved, with an increasing percentage of the labour force securing jobs as the unemployment rate recently dropped to 7.9 percent. Growth in the Banking, finance, insurance sector, as well as Accounting, audit, taxes have been key drivers in this online recruitment.”

Industry Year-over-year Trends: 15 of the 17 industries monitored by the Index showed positive annual growth trends.

- **Engineering** (up 56 percent) and **IT** (up 41 percent) continued to lead all sectors by measure of annual growth, with mild decelerations in annual growth pace relative to the nationwide average
- **Accounting, audit, taxes** (up 28 percent) was the only sector to exhibit accelerated year-over-year growth compared to February; online job availability in this sector is at its highest since March 2008, showing a recovery in demand for both professional level and technician/associate level financial workers
- **Banking, finance, insurance** (up 40 percent) registered a significant monthly rise, and is exhibiting among the most rapid annual gains in the Index
- **Education, training and library** (down two percent) slipped into a state of negative annual growth, making it the poorest trending sector in the Index

Occupation Year-over-year Trends: Annual online demand for workers rose in eight of the nine occupational categories in March.

- **Craft and related trades workers** (up 25 percent) maintained its annual growth trend, aligned with the relatively robust overall trend in the construction and extraction sector
- **Legislators, senior officials and managers** (up 39 percent) slowed from 65 percent in the February Index. Demand for management workers slipped, primarily in the administrative, organisation sector

Geographic Year-over-year Trends: All four markets recorded positive annual growth in March

- **Ostra Mellansverige** (up 33 percent) registered the strongest annual growth among regions during March. In contrast to nationwide averages, the region exhibited relatively strong gains for Management and consulting, and Production, manufacturing, maintenance, repair over the month. The region was also the primary source of new opportunities in Banking, finance, insurance
- **Vastsverige** (up 12 percent) slowed more than any other region by measure of annual growth in the Index

International Trends:

Monster Employment Index Europe increased 26 percent year-over-year, the most rapid pace seen during the current economic cycle. Industrial production related sectors led the Index in terms of annual growth in March, while notable improvements were observed across the financial services segment.
