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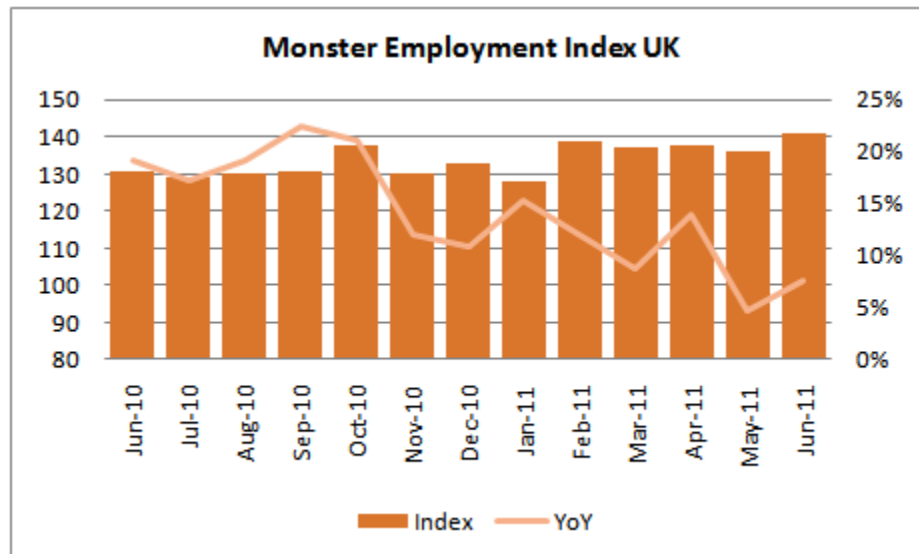
UK's online recruitment expands, according to Monster's Employment Index

June 2011 Index Highlights:

- The Monster Employment Index UK (up eight percent) reports that online recruitment is continuing its growth momentum in June, with annual gains increasing from the prior month's five percent pace
- June's online recruitment activity matches a level last achieved in December 2008, as the majority of sectors expand hiring efforts
- Engineering grows significantly over the year due to opportunities at management and technician level
- Occupations most closely associated with the manufacturing sector, including Plant machine operators and assemblers and Craft and related workers show the largest annual growth
- South West continues to show the greatest growth in online recruitment of all regions in 2011

The Monster Employment Index Europe is a monthly gauge of online job demand based on a real-time review of millions of employer job opportunities culled from a large representative selection of career websites and online job listings across Europe. The Index does not reflect the trend of any one advertiser or source, but is an aggregate measure of the change in job listings across the industry.

"With current Index levels rising eight percent the UK certainly has reason to feel comforted by an expanding job market," commented Michael Gentle, Monster UK & Ireland spokesperson. "However, a lot of new employment opportunities have come in the form of part-time work, especially in sectors like construction where firms are recruiting but not for long-term positions; this suggests the job market might not be as steady as the figures initially suggest. Nonetheless, overall recruitment growth continues in a positive direction, especially in the economy's key sectors."

Industry Year-over-year Trends: 15 of the 21 industry sectors monitored by the Index showed positive annual growth year-over-year.

- **Transport, post and logistics** (up 35 percent) and **Production, manufacturing, maintenance, repair** (up 27 percent) remained among the top growth sectors year-over-year, but have lost some momentum since the beginning of the year
- **Engineering** (up 32 percent) has grown significantly over the year due to opportunities at management and technician levels
- **Construction and extraction** (up 22 percent) remained among the top five industries in the Index by measure of annual growth, due to an increase in short-term contract work
- **Public sector, defence, community** (down 14 percent) showed a steep decline, placing it among the bottom sectors in the Index
- **Banking, finance, insurance** (down 10 percent) and **Legal** (down 16 percent) were among the largest declining sectors over the year, but both registered milder reductions in June than in May

Occupation Year-over-year Trends: Six of the nine occupational groups monitored by the Index showed positive annual growth.

- Occupations most closely associated with the manufacturing sector, including **Plant and machine operators and assemblers** (up 21 percent) and **Craft and related workers** (up 27 percent) showed the largest annual growth
- **Elementary occupations** (up 19 percent) reversed its downward trend and began to show an increase in online recruitment year-over-year
- **Skilled agricultural, forestry and fishery workers** (down 15 percent) showed the steepest annual decline and remained the lowest growth occupation

Geographic year-over-year Trends: Eight out of nine regions in the UK demonstrated positive annual growth in June.

- **South West** (up 25 percent) was the top growth region in June, with IT and engineering recruitment expanding substantially
- **London** (up 12 percent) showed an increase in annual online recruitment and a positive trend month-over-month, reversing the previous downward trend
- **Scotland** (down one percent) continued to exhibit a modest year-over-year decline; all other regions charted positive growth over the year

International Trends:

The Monster Employment Index Europe demonstrated 23 percent annual growth in June, up from the 21 percent observed in May. Industrial production related sectors led the Index for the fifth consecutive month while the Arts, Public sector, defence and community and Banking sectors exhibited annual declines. Germany remained the star performer, leading all countries up.
